Geopolitical Catalysts: War, Defeat, and the Collapse of Autocracy

The onset of World War I proved the fatal accelerant. Tsar Nicholas II's decision to personally command the army in 1915, despite his incompetence, removed the monarch from strategic control and tied imperial fate to battlefield failures. The Brusilov Offensive (1916), though tactically successful, drained manpower and resources. More devastating were the logistical collapses: food shortages, supply chain breakdowns, and rampant inflation. The Second All-Russian Congress of Soviets formally transferred power to the Bolsheviks. Yet this transition was framed as a restoration of popular sovereignty—Soviets, not a centralized state, would lead. The reality would soon diverge sharply from this ideal.

Industrial Impact and State Repression: The Revolutionary Economy

The revolution's industrial legacy was paradoxical. Initially, the Bolsheviks nationalized banks, railways, and factories, aiming to dismantle capitalist relations. The Decree on Land abolished private ownership, redistributing 700 million hectares to peasants. Yet wartime conditions and civil war (1918–1922) forced pragmatic reversals. War Communism (1918–1921)—forced requisition of grain, abolition of markets—crushed peasant morale, triggering famine and resistance. Industrial output collapsed, urban populations starved, and the state responded with the Red Terror, executing thousands deemed counter-revolutionary.
