Today, kava’s global resurgence reflects a dual narrative: on one hand, a wellness trend driven by demand for natural anxiolytics; on the other, a battleground over cultural rights and regulation. Western scientific interest—focused on its anxiolytic, neuroprotective, and muscle-relaxant properties—has led to clinical trials for generalized anxiety disorder and post-traumatic stress. Yet, kavalactones raise hepatotoxicity concerns when consumed in high doses or combined with pharmaceuticals, prompting regulatory scrutiny. Australia, New Zealand, and parts of the U.S. have imposed strict limits on kava sales, while Germany and other EU nations enforce rigorous safety standards.
