Its fibrous texture allows controlled deformation, essential for replicating the subtle curvature of a real katana or the elegant tapering of a ceremonial **shinai** (bamboo sword). In contemporary practice, some innovators blend traditional **washi** with synthetic composites to enhance durability, but purists argue this dilutes the spiritual integrity of the form.
