Collaborative platforms, open-source databases, and decentralized production models enabled contributors from over 70 countries to upload content, often incorporating local archives, indigenous knowledge, and underrepresented archives. This democratization

challenged the historical monopoly of Western institutions, redistributing narrative authority to those historically excluded from dominant historical discourse.

Geopolitical and Economic Context: The Rise of Counter-Narratives in a Multipolar World
