But even within these constraints, innovators pushed boundaries. Georges Méliès' use of stop-motion, double exposure, and hand-painted color transformed technical limitations into narrative tools. Cook argues that Méliès' work established cinema as a medium of invention, not mere reproduction. In India, Dadasaheb Phalke's **Raja Harishchandra** (1913) combined mythological storytelling with nascent cinematic techniques, laying groundwork for a parallel cinematic tradition. In Latin America, early filmmakers like Argentina's Julio Bracho blended European influences with national themes, crafting narratives of identity amid political upheaval. Cook emphasizes that these regional evolutions were never passive imitations but active reimaginings, shaped by local histories, languages, and cultural values. The geopolitical context of the interwar period further complicated narrative cinema's development. As fascism rose in Europe, film became a battleground of propaganda. Nazi Germany weaponized cinema through Leni Riefenstahl's **Triumph of the Will** (1935), merging spectacle with ideological messaging. Soviet cinema, under Eisenstein, developed montage as revolutionary pedagogy—**Battleship Potemkin** (1925) used rapid editing and emotional montage to dramatize class struggle, turning film into a tool of class consciousness. Cook argues that these divergent paths—authoritarian spectacle, socialist realism, liberal humanism—revealed cinema's dual potential: as both entertainment and ideological apparatus. Cook's analysis of industrial structure underscores how economic imperatives shaped narrative form. The studio system's emphasis on profitability incentivized formulaic storytelling, repetition of successful templates, and risk aversion. Independent filmmakers, often marginalized, pioneered innovation—from German Expressionism's distorted sets to Soviet montage—but struggled for visibility. The Great Depression deepened this divide: studios doubled down on escapist fare—romances, comedies, westerns—while independent and foreign films offered counter-narratives of social critique. By the 1940s, World War II transformed cinema yet again. Governments harnessed narrative to boost morale, demonize enemies, and unify populations. Cook highlights Ray's **Pather Panchali** (1955) as a landmark: a neorealist-inspired portrait of rural Bengali life, rejecting both colonial spectacle and urban elitism. The French New Wave of the late 1950s and 1960s marked a radical break. Truffaut, Godard, and others rejected studio discipline, embracing improvisation, hand-held cameras, and fragmented narratives. Their work—**Breathless** (1960), **The 400 Blows** (1959)—challenged continuity editing, linear storytelling, and authorial omniscience. Cook sees this movement not just as aesthetic rebellion, but as a response to postwar alienation and youth disillusionment. Neorealism's influence—on location shooting, non-professional actors, social realism—spread globally, inspiring movements from Italian Neorealism to Japanese Nikkan Eiga. Cook also examines the rise of national cinemas as sites of resistance. In Latin America, the Cuban Revolution catalyzed state-supported filmmaking, with directors like Santiago Álvarez using montage to document revolution. In South Asia, parallel cinema offered counter-narratives to Bollywood's commercial formul
