But today, Africa’s youthful population—projected to double by 2050, with over 60% under 25—represents a demographic tidal wave with transformative economic

potential. Simultaneously, the planet's energy transition has thrust the continent into the center of global competition, as critical minerals—lithium, cobalt, rare earth elements, and copper—underpin the technologies that will define 21st-century power: batteries, solar panels, wind turbines, and next-generation computing. This dual dynamic—demographic promise and mineral imperative—has catalyzed a scramble not only for resources, but for influence. Unlike the colonial era, where extraction was extractive and linear, today's engagement is layered: involving state actors, multinational corporations, private equity, and non-traditional powers. China's early 21st-century surge set the template: a blend of infrastructure financing, state-backed loans, and long-term resource access agreements that bypassed Western-led development models. Today, that playbook has been refined, contested, and expanded by a multipolar cast—India with its “Africa First” diplomacy, Turkey's growing military and commercial footprint, the Gulf states' investments in ports and agribusiness, and Russia's Wagner Group leveraging private military and security networks in resource-rich zones. The economic geography of this scramble is as complex as it is contested. Sub-Saharan Africa holds an estimated \$3.4 trillion in mineral wealth, with the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC) alone accounting for over 70% of global cobalt production—essential for electric vehicle batteries. The

continent possesses 40% of the world's renewable energy potential, from the solar deserts of the Sahel to the offshore wind corridors of East Africa. Yet, despite this abundance, Africa accounts for just 3% of global GDP and only 2.5% of foreign direct investment (FDI) inflows, a gap that fuels both desperation and opportunity.

Governments across the continent now face a pivotal choice: extract value through strategic partnerships that build industrial capacity, or remain dependent on commodity exporters and raw material suppliers. This tension is reflected in the evolving architecture of foreign engagement. China's Forum on China-Africa Cooperation (FOCAC), held every three years, exemplifies a state-led model emphasizing infrastructure—railways, ports, power grids—with a focus on long-term debt instruments and joint ventures. By 2023, China had invested over \$200 billion in Africa, with infrastructure projects accounting for nearly 40% of total investments. Yet, this model has drawn sharp criticism: debt sustainability concerns, environmental degradation, and allegations of labor exploitation have led to public backlash, particularly in countries like Zambia and Sri Lanka (a cautionary tale now cited across the continent). In response, Western powers have reconfigured their approaches. The U.S., through the Prosper Africa initiative launched in 2018, seeks to double two-way trade to \$100 billion by 2030, emphasizing private sector development, tech transfer, and democratic governance. The EU's Global Gateway, a

€300 billion infrastructure plan, positions itself as a sustainable alternative to debt-trap diplomacy, though its pace and scale remain under scrutiny. France, despite recent tensions with former colonies, continues to maintain deep economic ties in West Africa, particularly in energy and defense. Germany, historically cautious, has ramped up investments in green hydrogen and digital infrastructure, aligning with its industrial decarbonization goals. But the new scramble is not solely a contest between East and West. Turkey's presence, often overlooked, is increasingly significant: Ankara has established over 60 trade offices across Africa and signed \$15 billion in infrastructure deals, emphasizing soft power through education, health, and construction. The UAE, leveraging Dubai's role as a financial hub, has invested heavily in ports (e.g., Berbera in Somaliland), logistics, and fintech, positioning itself as a gateway between Africa and the Gulf. India, with \$35 billion in trade and 120 development projects, focuses on agriculture, pharmaceuticals, and digital connectivity, reflecting its non-colonial narrative but deep strategic interests. Russia's role, though less visible, is defined by Wagner Group's militarized presence in the Central African Republic, Mali, and Sudan—where private security operatives secure mining operations in exchange for political influence and access to resources. This hybrid model—combining mercenary force with economic leverage—represents a radical departure from traditional

diplomacy, challenging Western norms of sovereignty and intervention. The human dimension of this scramble is often obscured by geopolitical bravado. Millions of African citizens are directly affected by foreign investment projects—some empowered through job creation and skill transfer, others displaced by land grabs or exploited in informal mining economies. In the DRC, artisanal cobalt miners—many children—work in hazardous conditions feeding global supply chains, while elite contracts with foreign firms often bypass local communities. The paradox is stark: Africa’s resources are being extracted at unprecedented scale to fuel the green transition, yet the continent benefits only marginally from the downstream value. This asymmetry fuels skepticism and resistance, as seen in recent protests against mining operations in Nigeria, Ethiopia, and Zambia. Expert analysis reveals that the new scramble is less about conquest than control—control over supply chains, strategic chokepoints, and digital infrastructure. The race for 5G networks, data centers, and satellite constellations mirrors earlier commodity booms: who connects Africa first, secures not just profit but geopolitical leverage. China’s Huawei, for instance, has deployed 4G and 5G infrastructure across 40 African countries, raising security concerns among Western allies. The U.S. and EU have responded with initiatives to counter Chinese dominance in critical tech sectors, including the Partnership for Global Infrastructure and Investment

(PGII) and the EU's Digital Decade agenda, which prioritize African digital sovereignty. Yet, beneath these strategic layers lies a deeper structural tension: the mismatch between Africa's developmental needs and the extractive logic of foreign investment. Most African economies remain dependent on primary commodities, limiting their ability to negotiate equitable terms. Industrial policy is often constrained by weak institutions, corruption, and political instability—factors exploited by external actors seeking quick returns. As one Nigerian economist observed, 'We trade our land for promises we can't keep.' This cynicism reflects a continent learning from decades of uneven partnerships, demanding not just capital, but capacity. The environmental implications further complicate the narrative. While Africa holds 30% of the world's potential for renewable energy, its own energy access remains limited—600 million lack electricity. The global push for green minerals creates a Catch-22: to decarbonize, the world needs Africa's lithium, cobalt, and copper; to develop sustainably, Africa must scale clean energy infrastructure, which requires investment and technology transfer. The African Union's Agenda 2063 envisions a self-reliant, integrated continent powered by green energy—but achieving this requires rethinking the old extractive model. Financial mechanisms are evolving in response. Blended finance—combining public and private capital to de-risk investments—is gaining traction, particularly through

institutions like the African Development Bank and the World Bank's Scaling Up Renewable Energy Program. Impact investing and green bonds are emerging as tools to channel capital toward sustainable projects. Yet, transparency remains a critical fault line: opaque contracts, offshore financial flows, and weak regulatory oversight continue to undermine public trust. The 2023 exposé of hidden debt agreements involving several African governments—facilitated by offshore intermediaries—highlighted systemic vulnerabilities that foreign actors sometimes exploit. Security dynamics have also shifted. As foreign military presence expands, so do local perceptions of neocolonialism. In the Sahel, Wagner's operations have been met with growing hostility, with communities rejecting foreign mercenaries in favor of local forces. Similarly, French troops withdrew from Mali in 2022 amid popular anger over perceived occupation. These reversals underscore a fundamental reality: military presence without political legitimacy risks fueling instability rather than securing it. Looking ahead, the next phase of the scramble will be defined by three forces: technological sovereignty, climate resilience, and regional integration. African nations are increasingly asserting agency—through the Continental Free Trade Area (AfCFTA), launched in 2021, which aims to create a \$3.4 trillion single market and boost intra-African trade. This initiative, backed by 54 countries, signals a strategic pivot from external dependency to

regional self-reliance. However, implementation gaps—infrastructure deficits, non-tariff barriers, political fragmentation—threaten its success. Meanwhile, climate change acts as a threat multiplier. Droughts, floods, and desertification are destabilizing food systems and displacing populations, particularly in the Sahel and Horn of Africa. This environmental stress intensifies competition over arable land and water, potentially triggering new conflicts. Yet, it also creates opportunities for green innovation—solar microgrids, drought-resistant crops, climate-smart finance—where African leadership could position the continent as a global model for adaptation. The role of diaspora communities and African entrepreneurs is another underappreciated dimension. Remittances exceed \$100 billion annually, rivaling official development assistance. Tech hubs in Lagos, Nairobi, Cape Town, and Addis Ababa are incubating startups that leverage mobile technology, fintech, and agri-tech to solve local problems. These innovations, often bootstrapped with limited external funding, reflect a new generation of African agency—less dependent on foreign patronage, more focused on homegrown solutions. Global comparisons reveal both similarities and contrasts. The South China Sea rivalry shares the theme of strategic resource competition, but Africa’s case is distinct in its developmental urgency and demographic potential. Unlike the Cold War proxy conflicts, today’s engagements are multifaceted—economic, technological,

environmental—blending cooperation and competition. Russia’s Wagner model diverges from Western statecraft, relying on asymmetric force rather than institutional diplomacy. India’s soft power approach contrasts with China’s capital-heavy model, emphasizing long-term partnerships over short-term extraction. The long-term implications hinge on whether Africa can transition from raw material exporter to value-added producer. This requires deliberate policy choices: investing in education and industrial parks, enforcing transparent mining codes, developing digital infrastructure, and fostering regional value chains. It also demands global cooperation—reforming trade rules, debt relief mechanisms, and climate finance to align with African priorities. Experts warn that failure to navigate this transition risks entrenching dependency, deepening inequality, and exacerbating global instability. The continent’s youth bulge, if harnessed, could drive innovation and economic growth. But without structural reforms, corruption, and external manipulation, Africa may remain a supplier of resources and a battleground of influence—rather than a leader in the global green and digital transition. In conclusion, the new scramble for Africa is not a repetition of history, but a reconfiguration of power in a world reordering around resources, technology, and climate. It is a contest not just of states, but of systems—of whether Africa’s future is shaped by extractive paradigms or self-determined development.

The continent stands at a crossroads: one path leads to deeper dependency and instability; the other, to industrial sovereignty, regional integration, and global leadership. The choice, and its consequences, will resonate for generations.

## **Origins: From Colonial Rivalry to Strategic Reordering**

Long before the term “new scramble” entered geopolitical lexicon, Africa was the epicenter of Europe’s imperial ambition. The Berlin Conference of 1884–85 carved the continent into arbitrary spheres of influence, formalizing a scramble driven by resource extraction—rubber, ivory, palm oil, and later minerals like copper and cobalt. Colonial powers built railways and ports, not for African development, but to extract wealth efficiently. This era left deep scars: fractured borders, extractive institutions, and a legacy of underdevelopment that persisted long after independence. Postcolonial states inherited economies skewed toward primary commodities, limiting their bargaining power in global markets.

Yet, the colonial blueprint was never fully completed. By the mid-20th century, decolonization reshaped Africa’s political landscape, but economic dependency endured. The 1970s oil shocks and structural adjustment programs imposed by the IMF and World Bank reinforced a model

of raw material export, with little investment in local industry. This historical inertia helps explain why today’s competition—though framed in modern terms—often replicates old patterns: foreign firms securing mineral rights with minimal local benefit, infrastructure built to serve export rather than domestic needs, and political influence wielded through resource leverage. The shift began in the early 2000s, accelerated by China’s entry. Unlike Western powers, China offered non-conditioned financing—loans tied to infrastructure projects without demands for governance reforms or human rights compliance. This model resonated in countries disillusioned with Western conditional aid. By 2020, China’s investments exceeded \$200 billion across Africa, with infrastructure accounting for nearly half. Railways in Kenya, ports in Djibouti, and power plants in Zambia exemplify this shift. But China’s approach, criticized for opaque contracts and environmental neglect, set a precedent that other powers
