a 40% increase in illicit hedgehog exports from Eastern Europe between 2019 and 2023, often disguised as “rescue” or “research” animals. Such practices not only endanger individual animals but fuel illegal wildlife trafficking networks, undermining conservation efforts worldwide.

Economic Impact: From Hobbyist Niche to Industry Sector

The hedgehog pet phenomenon has evolved into a significant economic force, particularly in niche markets across Europe and North America. Technological innovation—such as automated feeding systems, climate-controlled enclosures, and DNA health screening—could enhance welfare and reduce mortality, making pets safer for owners and more sustainable for breeders. Such frameworks could prevent exploitation while legitimizing ethical breeding networks.

However, generational shifts may also bring deeper scrutiny: younger owners increasingly demand transparency, ethical sourcing, and environmental accountability. The Globalization of Hedgehog Pet Culture: A Transnational Supply Chain

Breeders in the UK, Germany, and the Netherlands invested heavily in controlled breeding programs, reducing reliance on wild capture but creating new economic dependencies. In countries like Ukraine and Romania, where hedgehog farming now represents a significant agricultural diversification, local economies have adapted to meet export standards, blending traditional husbandry with modern veterinary oversight.

Expert Perspectives: From Conservationists to Behavioral Scientists

The hedgehog's journey into domesticity has provoked a spectrum of expert responses, reflecting deeper tensions between conservation ethics, animal welfare, and human desire. Conservation biologists caution against the commodification of wild species.
