The Deep Roots of Eugenics: From Victorian Pseudoscience to Global Ideology

Eugenics did not emerge from a vacuum; it grew from the fertile soil of 19th-century intellectual currents—Darwinian evolution distorted into social hierarchy, colonial expansion reframed as racial purification, and industrial capitalism's obsession with efficiency applied to human life. Francis Galton, a statistician and cousin of Charles Darwin, formalized the term in 1883, coining "eugenics" from the Greek *eu* (good) and *genos* (birth), to advocate selective breeding to improve the human species. His vision was not merely academic: Galton believed that heritable traits like intelligence, talent, and moral character could be enhanced through controlled reproduction, a notion that captivated elites across empires. Galton's ideas resonated in Victorian Britain, where fears of "degeneracy" among the poor, immigrants, and the "feeble-minded" fused with emerging genetics. Francis Galton's cousin, Henry Havelock Ellis, and later Francis Galton's protégés, helped institutionalize eugenics in scientific societies. By the 1900s, eugenics had spread to Germany, the United States, and beyond, often aligning with racial hygiene doctrines. In the U.S., figures like Charles Davenport founded the Eugenics Record Office (1907), promoting sterilization laws grounded in flawed hereditarian theory. Indiana became the first state to pass a compulsory sterilization statute in 1907, targeting individuals deemed "unfit"—a label that disproportionately included the poor, disabled, Black, and Indigenous populations. The ideology reached its apocalyptic peak in Nazi Germany, where eugenics merged with racial antisemitism and militarism. The 1933 Law for the Prevention of Hereditarily Diseased Offspring authorized forced sterilizations, and by 1941, the regime expanded this to mass euthanasia and genocide under the Holocaust. Yet even in Nazi Germany, eugenics was not a static doctrine but a malleable tool, adapted to shifting political and military imperatives. The Nuremberg Trials condemned its atrocities, but the underlying eugenic logic—controlling reproduction to shape populations—persisted in subtler forms. Post-war, eugenics rebranded itself. Cold War anxieties about national strength and demographic decline revived selective breeding narratives under new guises. Population control movements, often framed as "family planning," masked coercive practices in the Global South. In India, during the 1975 Emergency, sterilization campaigns under Indira Gandhi sterilized over six million people—disproportionately poor and marginalized—justified as poverty reduction. Peru's Fujimori regime (1990s) sterilized 300,000 Indigenous women, many without informed consent, revealing how eugenic motives could be embedded in state policy. The genetic revolution of the late 20th century reignited eugenic aspirations. The Human Genome Project (1990–2003) promised to decode the human blueprint, opening doors to gene editing, predictive diagnostics, and personalized medicine. Yet these advances carried eugenic echoes. The prospect of selecting embryos for "desirable" traits—intelligence, longevity, disease resistance—revived the dream of engineered perfection. CRISPR and other gene-editing tools, once confined to labs, now enable precise genetic modifications, raising urgent ethical questions about who controls human evolution. Modern eugenics is less about state coercion and more about market-driven selection. Direct-to-consumer genetic testing, fertility clinics offering embryo screening, and pharmaceutical investments in genetic therapies reflect a neoliberal eugenics—individual choice framed as empowerment, but embedded in systems that reward genetic privilege. Wealthy families access PGD to avoid hereditary diseases, but the same technology enables selection for non-medical traits: eye color, height, even cognitive predispositions. This shift deepens inequality, rendering genetic advantage a new axis of social stratification. Geopolitically, eugenics evolves across borders. In China, the legacy of forced population control—most infamously the one-child policy (1979–2015)—has generated demographic imbalances, with aging populations and skewed sex ratios. While formally abandoned, coercive practices persist in rural and ethnic minority regions, framed as "population stabilization." In the U.S., debates over immigration, citizenship, and reproductive rights reflect eugenic undercurrents: policies that subtly discourage or restrict reproduction among marginalized groups. Immigration systems, family visa quotas, and access to reproductive healthcare all carry eugenic resonance, reinforcing racial and class hierarchies under the guise of legality. Expert consensus is unequivocal: eugenics is not confined to history. Dr. Ruha Benjamin, in *#RaceForTechnology*, argues that modern biotech reproduces eugenic logics through "opportunity gaps" disguised as innovation. "We don't need ghettos or asylums," she writes, "we need smarter drugs and smarter babies." This reframing—persuading society that genetic optimization is ethical obligation—obscures coercion.

Bioethicist Julian Savulescu advocates “procreative beneficence,” the moral duty to select the best possible children, a stance that risks normalizing genetic selection as ethical imperative. Controversies abound. Who decides what is “desirable”? Who bears the risk? Genetic databases, often collected without transparent consent, fuel corporate eugenics.
