By the 1990s, breeders in China, the U.S., and Europe expanded operations, establishing breeding networks that blended traditional knowledge with industrial-scale production. Large-scale breeding facilities, particularly in China's Guangdong and Sichuan provinces, began supplying puppies to global markets, often prioritizing rapid turnover over health screening. This shift fueled controversies over genetic health—conditions like brachycephalic airway syndrome, patellar luxation, and progressive retinal atrophy became endemic due to inbreeding and selective pressure for extreme traits. Experts in veterinary genetics, such as Dr. Sarah H. Johnson

of the University of Cambridge's Veterinary Genetics Lab, have documented how breed purity standards, while preserving conformation, have inadvertently eroded genetic resilience. "The Shih Tzu's morphology is a product of extreme selection," Johnson explains. "Flattened muzzles enhance cuteness but compromise respiratory function; dense coats require intensive grooming, increasing susceptibility to skin disorders. We now see a trade-off between aesthetic appeal and welfare—a tension that defines modern pedigree breeding." The industry response has been mixed. While some registries have introduced health screening mandates, enforcement remains inconsistent. Meanwhile, ethical breeders—particularly in Japan and parts of Europe—have championed outcrossing strategies to improve genetic diversity, though these efforts remain marginal. The rise of DNA testing services, such as Embark and Wisdom Panel, has empowered owners to trace lineage and screen for hereditary conditions, but access and affordability limit widespread impact. This industrialization reflects a broader crisis in pedigree dog breeding: the clash between cultural heritage and commercial imperatives.
