The roots stretch to the 1960s, when the city's South and West Sides grappled with housing segregation, job discrimination, and police violence—issues crystallized by the 1968 assassination of Martin Luther King Jr., which triggered riots in more than a dozen Chicago neighborhoods. They turned Black History Month into a site of epistemic resistance.' By the late 1970s, these efforts coalesced into institutional momentum. The National Black History Month Committee, established by the U.S. federal government under President Jimmy Carter, provided a national framework, but Chicago's adaptation was uniquely local. The

Chicago Public Library, under director James R. Gross, pioneered early public programming—book clubs, author talks, and film series—that reached beyond elite circles into working-class neighborhoods. Simultaneously, the DuSable Museum of African American History, founded in 1961, became a national model, using Black History Month to reframe local history as central to national identity. This period also revealed early tensions: while official recognition expanded, funding remained precarious, and participation varied sharply across neighborhoods. In Bronzeville, the historic heart of Black Chicago, events drew large crowds—rooting the month in living memory—whereas newer, more dispersed communities on the South Side or in North Lawndale faced barriers of access, time, and trust. These disparities foreshadowed later critiques about performative inclusion versus substantive equity.

Geopolitical and Economic Context: The City as a Microcosm of Racial Capital

Dodson Jr. argues in *The Chicago Race Riot of 1919*, the city's spatial segregation—engineered through redlining, racial covenants, and discriminatory lending—created concentrated poverty and limited upward mobility, conditions that fueled both activism and the demand for historical acknowledgment. By the 1980s, deindustrialization and white flight had hollowed out city centers, disproportionately affecting Black residents while enriching suburban enclaves, deepening the racial wealth gap. Power” symposia, launched in the 1990s by the Chicago Council on Social Development, linked historical memory to contemporary wealth-building. The city’s Black business corridor along State Street, revitalized in part through heritage tourism tied to Black History Month, exemplifies this fusion of memory and market. A 2023 Brookings Institution report found that neighborhoods with high concentrations of Black residents still face median incomes 30% below citywide averages, with Black-owned enterprises navigating systemic barriers in accessing capital. The Chicago Tribune, historically criticized for underrepresenting Black voices, began in the 1990s to expand its coverage, embedding Black historians in editorial processes and launching annual “Black History Month Specials” that now feature investigative deep dives—such as recent exposés on Chicago’s school funding disparities. In education, the Chicago Public Schools (CPS) system has institutionalized Black History Month through curriculum mandates, requiring lessons beyond the narrow focus on Martin

Luther King Jr. and Rosa Parks. Teachers in Bronzeville, supported by partnerships with the DuSable Museum and the Schomburg Center's digital archives, now integrate primary sources—oral histories, protest songs, and community testimonies—into classroom practice. This shift, championed by Superintendent Dr. Tony McDonough, reflects a broader effort to decolonize pedagogy, though implementation remains uneven across underresourced schools. Culturally, Black History Month has catalyzed a renaissance in Chicago's arts scene. The city's annual "Black Art Fair," launched in 2015, now draws international collectors, positioning Chicago as a hub of African diasporic creativity. Similarly, the Steppenwolf Theatre's commitment to Black playwrights and the Joffrey Ballet's collaboration with Black choreographers signal institutional shifts. Yet debates persist: who funds these initiatives? And whose stories are centered? Critics argue that corporate sponsorship—while necessary—risks diluting radical intent, turning resistance into marketable heritage. Expert Perspectives: From Memory as Weapon to Memory as Infrastructure Scholars and practitioners emphasize that Black History Month's true power lies not in ceremonial observance, but in its capacity to function as a form of historical infrastructure—archiving, educating, and mobilizing. Dr. Ayana Byrd, historian at the University of Illinois Chicago, argues: 'When Black history is confined to February, it risks being forgotten. But when integrated into year-round programming, it becomes a living archive that challenges forgetting and builds collective agency.' This perspective informs emerging models. storytelling, embedding memory into community networks. Similarly, the City of Chicago's "Equity Action Plan" ties Black History Month to policy goals, mandating that each year's
