A 2023 McKinsey study found that teams with high intrinsic motivation reported 37% higher innovation rates and 29% lower turnover—direct validation of Herzberg’s 64-year-old thesis. Globally, the implications vary. In high-wage economies like Germany and Sweden, her model complements robust social protections, reinforcing the idea that motivation thrives in ecosystems of security and respect. In emerging economies such as India and Nigeria, where informal labor dominates, her work inspires grassroots movements advocating for dignity in daily work—from street vendors to gig workers. Yet cultural nuances matter: in collectivist societies, recognition often takes communal forms, while individualist cultures emphasize personal achievement.
