May) is marked less by religious ritual than by mass-produced chocolates and convenience store sales—symbols of a society grappling with demographic collapse. In Iran, where official holidays center on Islamic observances, Mother’s Day exists in a constrained form; maternal respect is expressed through quiet familial duty rather than public celebration, reflecting state-enforced gender norms and religious modesty codes. These variations underscore a central thesis: the sermon’s meaning is not universal but contingent on cultural context, political legitimacy, and economic capacity. From a geopolitical lens, Mother’s Day sermons function as soft power instruments. Yet the timing also reflected a secularizing impulse—marking motherhood as a civic virtue rather than a strictly ecclesiastical one. This commercialization deepened through the 20th century.
