The fallout was immediate and far-reaching: resignations of senior officials in Iceland, Italy, and the UK; legislative reforms in the EU targeting beneficial ownership transparency; and a reinvigoration of public demand for financial accountability. Yet, Kochilas's work has not been without peril. In the wake of the Offshore Leaks, she became a target of state-sponsored disinformation campaigns, cyberattacks, and legal threats—particularly from jurisdictions with vested interests in financial secrecy. In 2016, her office in Berlin was raided under ambiguous anti-terror financing laws, though no charges were filed.

These incidents underscore a broader reality: investigative journalism in the age of concentrated power operates under constant threat. This work signals a new frontier: investigative journalism expanding beyond institutional finance into the lived realities of displaced populations. The long-term implications of her career are twofold. First, she has reasserted journalism’s capacity to act as a counterweight to power—even when that power operates in shadows. Second, she has demonstrated that sustainable impact requires not just exposés, but infrastructure: secure networks, ethical frameworks, and institutional resilience. In an era where disinformation spreads faster than fact-checking, Kochilas’s insistence on depth, context, and systemic analysis offers a blueprint for journalism’s survival. She has also reshaped the global perception of investigative work. Where once it was seen as niche or elite, today, her projects are referenced in policy debates, academic curricula, and public discourse. The Offshore Leaks, for instance, directly influenced the EU’s 2023 Corporate Sustainability Reporting Directive, mandating greater transparency on beneficial ownership. In Latin America, her methodologies have been adopted by grassroots collectives exposing land grabs and environmental crimes. Yet, challenges persist. Authoritarian regimes grow more
