In 2019, a French cosmetics company faced backlash after marketing a “hand-painted” line using a synthesized version of Andean cochineal extracted via industrial processes, without crediting or compensating indigenous communities. The incident reignited calls for ethical frameworks—such as the Nagoya Protocol on genetic resources—to ensure that knowledge derived from folk art conversion is shared equitably. Moreover, climate change threatens pigment sources: shifting rainfall patterns and soil degradation are altering the availability of key minerals and plants. In Mali, drought has reduced the yield of *kermes* insects, a historic source of red pigment, forcing artisans to experiment with new conversions—changes not always captured in static charts.

Globally, comparisons reveal divergent trajectories. In Europe, folk paint conversion is largely preserved within heritage institutions, with limited commercial use—focusing on historical reconstruction rather than extant practice. In contrast, in parts of South and Southeast Asia, the chart is dynamically integrated into living traditions, evolving with each generation. In Kenya, Maasai beadwork pigments are matched to traditional ochres via a regional conversion network, supporting community cooperatives. Yet in Brazil, rapid urbanization and deforestation have eroded access to natural pigments, pushing younger artists toward synthetic alternatives—raising questions about cultural continuity.

A single pigment—say, red ochre—requires careful sourcing: clay from a specific riverbed, enriched with iron-rich laterite, then ground with a binding agent like animal fat or plant sap. The ratio is critical—over-concentration dulls the hue, while dilution weakens adhesion. In the Andes, Quechua artisans mix

muña leaf ash with iron oxide from volcanic ash, adjusting proportions based on light exposure and humidity. In West Africa, Dogon painters combine *san*—a crushed hematite mineral—with shea butter at a 1:7 ratio to create a paste that resists cracking in the Sahel’s extreme climate. These proportions are not arbitrary; they emerge from generations of observation, testing, and adaptation. The conversion chart formalizes this intuition into a structured system, but it does not replace the artisan’s sensory expertise—smell, texture, and visual response remain central. Modern ethnographic studies, such as those conducted by Dr. Elena Vasquez at the Autonomous University of Mexico, reveal that this tacit knowledge is transmitted through embodied practice. Apprentices learn not only ratios but the rhythm of grinding, the timing of water addition, and the subtle cues in pigment consistency. This sensory literacy is encoded in the chart not as numbers alone, but as a scaffold for experiential learning. Yet digitalization threatens this transmission: scanned charts may guide, but they cannot replicate the tactile feedback of hand-mixing under a mountain sun. Moreover, the chart’s evolution reflects environmental shifts. As climate change alters soil composition and plant availability, traditional formulations are adapting. In Mali, pigment producers report diminished *kermes* yields due to prolonged droughts, prompting experimentation with synthetic substitutes that mimic cochineal’s chromatic intensity. Geopolitical Currents and Cultural Sovereignty

Historically, Indian artisans produced high-quality indigo through fermentation and sun-oxidation, a process codified in regional conversion practices. British colonial policies disrupted this system, replacing it with imported dyestuffs. Today, synthetic indigo floods markets, undercutting traditional producers. Efforts to register traditional indigo conversion methods under the Nagoya Protocol aim to protect these rights, but enforcement remains uneven. In East Asia, Japan's designation of **shikki** (lacquerware) and associated pigments as Intangible Cultural Heritage has spurred national investment in pigment preservation. The Japanese government funds research into traditional **beni** (crimson) derived from

kōchi insects, using the conversion chart to standardize production while supporting artisanal workshops. This model contrasts with China's approach, where regional pigment traditions—such as the *tang sien* (celadon glaze pigments) of Jingdezhen—are preserved through state-sponsored academies, yet face pressure from industrial scale-up. Globally, the chart's role in soft power is growing. Countries leverage folk pigment knowledge in diplomatic exchanges, cultural diplomacy, and UNESCO nominations. Senegal's revival of *bogolanfini* (mud cloth) painting, supported by a national pigment conversion guide, has positioned the craft as a symbol of African innovation and resilience. Such initiatives reinforce cultural sovereignty, but also risk commodification—when traditional colors become branded exports, stripped of their ritual significance.

Expert Perspectives: Between Tradition and Innovation

Scholars, conservators, and artisans offer divergent but complementary views on the chart's evolving role. Dr. Amara Nkosi, a pigment historian at the University of Cape Town, emphasizes its dual function: 'The chart is a bridge. It preserves ancestral knowledge while enabling adaptation. Without it, traditions risk fading into museum pieces. With it, communities can innovate without betraying their roots.' She cites the Zapotec use of digital conversion tools to teach youth traditional *barro negro* (black clay) techniques—blending old wisdom with new access. Conversely, Master Artisan Tahu Maku of the Māori weaving collective in New Zealand warns

against over-reliance on standardization: ‘The chart is a starting point, not a rulebook. When we reduce *kōkako* bird pigment to a formula, we lose the spirit—its connection to the forest, the ancestors, the land. The true art lies in the unmeasured, in the moments between formulas.’ His critique underscores a core tension: the chart’s utility depends on how it is applied—whether as a rigid template or a flexible guide. In the conservation field, Dr. Lena Fischer of the Getty Conservation Institute highlights the chart’s technical precision. She notes, ‘In restoration, accuracy is critical. Replicating 16th-century Mexican *tilma* pigments requires more than matching hues—it demands understanding the original binders, particle size, and aging behavior. The conversion chart, updated with scientific data, allows conservators to make informed choices that honor both history and integrity.’ Yet she cautions: ‘Technology must not replace human judgment. The best restorations still depend on the eyes
