Beyond politics and ritual, Mesoamerican societies excelled in specialized industries that defined regional and interregional exchange. Obsidian working, for instance, was a high-value craft. Sources like Pachuca (Hidalgo) and El Chayal (Guatemala) produced blades of unmatched sharpness, used for tools, weapons, and sacrificial implements. Workshops in Teotihuacán and later Tenochtitlan employed standardized knapping techniques and quality control, indicating proto-industrial organization. Similarly, jade carving—valued more than gold—was a ritualized craft, with artisans transforming greenstone into figurines, pendants, and ceremonial axes, often inscribed with mythic narratives. Textile production was another pillar of economic sophistication. The Maya and Aztecs produced fine cotton and maguey fiber garments, dyed with cochineal red and indigo blue, reserved for elites and deities. Quipus—knotted string records—managed inventories and tribute in the Inca-adjacent Zapotec and Mixtec, though Mesoamerican systems relied more on glyphic notation and memory.
