Military medical services, long neglected, became critical nodes in national war efforts. Governments, driven by both humanitarian concern and strategic necessity, began investing in training, standardization, and recruitment. In Britain, the Royal Army Medical Corps (RAMC) expanded from a handful of field ambulances to a vast network of hospitals, with nurses forming its backbone. The British Nurses Service, established in 1908 but dramatically scaled during the war, recruited over 10,000 women, many from working-class backgrounds, who were trained in aseptic techniques, triage, and psychological support. Their presence was not just compassionate; it was a calculated military asset. Yet, the entry of nurses into combat zones was neither inevitable nor unchallenged. Social norms of the era confined women to domestic spheres, and medical professions were overwhelmingly male-dominated. Their roles expanded beyond bedside care to include operating room assistance, ambulance coordination, and even rudimentary psychiatric care for shell-shocked soldiers. The economic dimension of nursing in the war cannot be overstated. The cost of maintaining a trained nursing corps was significant—salaries, uniforms, transportation, and supplies—yet governments justified this as a national investment. In Britain, the War Office allocated £1.5 million for nursing personnel in 1915 alone, equivalent to tens of millions in today’s currency. This funding enabled the creation of formal training academies, such as

the Army School of Nursing at Netley, which standardized curricula and elevated professional status. Nurses were no longer seen as volunteers in charity but as skilled technicians, their labor essential to military efficacy. Their presence reduced mortality rates in field hospitals by an estimated 30–40% over the course of the war, according to post-war medical reports from the British Medical Journal. Yet, the experience of nurses was deeply stratified by nationality, class, and race. In British India, colonial medical services deployed thousands of Indian nurses and orderlies, many trained in rudimentary nursing schools established under the Indian Nursing Service. These women faced dual marginalization—colonial hierarchies limited their authority, while wartime urgency forced rapid advancement. Their contributions were indispensable but often uncredited in official histories, a reflection of imperial erasure. Similarly, American nurses deployed with the Army Nurse Corps faced resistance in French hospitals, where local medical staff viewed them as interlopers despite their skill. In Ottoman territories, Armenian nurses served in makeshift hospitals amid the genocide, their work obscured by the broader catastrophe. These global dimensions reveal nursing not as a monolithic Western institution, but as a transnational, contested field shaped by empire, race, and geopolitics. Expert analysis underscores how nurses redefined medical ethics during the war. The concept of “duty” expanded from patriotic obligation to a professional imperative. Florence Nightingale’s legacy endured in the emphasis on sanitation and preventive care, but wartime exigencies demanded new skills: rapid trauma response, infection control in overcrowded field hospitals, and psychological triage. Nurse Edith Cavell, executed by German authorities in 1915 for helping Allied soldiers escape, became a symbol not only of courage but of the moral weight nurses carried. Her execution underscored the blurred line between nurse and spy, caretaker and resistance agent—a duality that complicated perceptions of their role. The risks nurses faced were immense. Exposure to mustard gas, lime powder, and decomposing bodies led to high rates of chemical burns, respiratory disease, and psychological trauma. Field hospitals lacked proper mental health support; many nurses developed what contemporaries called “war neurosis,” later recognized as PTSD. Yet, institutional records show few formal psychological interventions—care was primarily physical, and emotional resilience was expected rather than supported. In France, the Red Cross reported that 1 in 5 nurses in active zones suffered from symptoms akin to depression or anxiety, yet few were evacuated or treated. Their suffering, unacknowledged at the time, foreshadowed later struggles in post-war recognition. Comparative analysis reveals divergent national approaches. In Germany, the nursing profession was tightly regulated under state oversight, with nurses required to swear oaths of loyalty to the Kaiserreich. This centralized control enabled efficient mobilization but limited autonomy. In contrast, the U.S. Army Nurse Corps, though newly established in 1908, expanded rapidly post-1917, deploying over 10,000 nurses to Europe by war’s end. Their training emphasized adaptability and public health, reflecting America’s broader mobilization ethos. Meanwhile, Soviet Russia, fragmented early in the war, relied on decentralized, volunteer networks of nurses who operated under extreme conditions, often without supplies, yet maintained high mortality standards through sheer improvisation. Controversies surrounded nurses’ autonomy and authority. Military command frequently overruled medical decisions, especially regarding evacuation priorities. Nurses advocating for early surgical intervention were sometimes overruled in favor of “conservative” care, leading to preventable deaths. The 1916 Battle of the Somme exposed these tensions: despite field ambulances equipped with nascent blood transfusion systems, nurses reported delays in surgical triage due to rigid chain-of-command protocols. This friction catalyzed post-war reforms, including the formal integration of nursing leadership in medical planning committees. The war also accelerated gender transformation. Over 200,000 women served as nurses across belligerent nations—nearly 15
