Facial recognition in public spaces, once confined to speculative fiction, is now operational in cities from Shanghai to Los Angeles, often without transparent consent or oversight. Second, algorithmic bias embedded in predictive policing, housing allocation, or welfare distribution can entrench inequality under the veneer of objectivity. A 2021 MIT study revealed that over 60% of urban predictive systems exhibited skewed outcomes against low-income and minority communities, reinforcing historical disparities rather than

correcting them. Third, the digital divide deepened: access to smart city benefits—real-time transit updates, e-governance portals, app-based reporting—remained stratified along lines of income, literacy, and infrastructure, creating a new form of civic exclusion.
