The thickness of these walls varies—often ranging from 350 mm to over 600 mm in high-rise applications—depending on building height, local fire codes, and elevator capacity. A critical yet

Gaskets, expansion joints, and sealing membranes must maintain continuity across transitions where vertical shafts puncture floor diaphragms and roof decks. A single design flaw—insufficient fireproofing thickness, inadequate sealing, or poor expansion accommodation—can trigger costly retrofits, construction delays, or regulatory penalties. In 2018, a high-rise project in Dubai faced a \$12 million remediation after fire tests revealed shaft wall delamination under thermal stress, underscoring the financial stakes of under-detailed construction. Conversely, meticulous shaft wall engineering enhances building longevity, reduces maintenance costs, and improves marketability—factors increasingly critical in an era of sustainable real estate valuation. Expert insights reveal a growing recognition of the shaft wall’s systemic role.
