In contrast, nations with nuclear arsenals or non-aligned yet militarized stances often treat the story with ambivalence—either sidelining it to avoid confronting uncomfortable legacies or appropriating it rhetorically without material commitment to disarmament. This tension

underscores a broader paradox: while the story inspires global solidarity, its impact remains constrained by geopolitical realities where nuclear weapons remain central to strategic calculations.
