Dante's *Divine Comedy* (1320) redefined vernacular poetry, composing in Italian rather than Latin, thus democratizing access to theological and philosophical inquiry. Dante's journey through Hell, Purgatory, and Paradise was not merely personal but political—a critique of papal corruption and imperial overreach. The *Comedy*'s integration of classical philosophy (Aristotle, Virgil) with Christian dogma reflected the
