The World Health Organization estimates that Nigeria requires an additional 28,000 nurses to meet basic care standards—yet the reality on the ground remains starkly different. This brain drain is not merely a personnel issue—it is a structural determinant of health outcomes. Economically, the cost of underinvestment in nursing capacity is measurable. The IMF estimates that every 10% increase in nurse-to-patient ratios reduces hospital readmission rates by 15%, cutting long-term costs by billions. Yet many LMICs allocate less than 2% of health budgets to nursing education and retention—far below the WHO's recommended 6%. This underfunding perpetuates a cycle: poor working conditions drive turnover, which increases reliance on unqualified staff, further degrading care quality.
