Today's computer teacher operates within a complex ecosystem of competing priorities: technical fluency, pedagogical innovation, systemic inequity, and ethical responsibility. Interviews probe not just what teachers know, but how they navigate these tensions. Foundational knowledge—algorithms, data structures, computational thinking—is essential, but must be contextualized within history and evolution. Yet, systemic barriers persist. Infrastructure deficits—unreliable power, outdated devices, limited connectivity—undermine learning. In sub-Saharan Africa, teachers describe shared tablets, intermittent internet, and curricula disconnected from local realities. In contrast, nations like Estonia integrate CS across disciplines, leveraging national digital platforms to enable personalized, project-based learning. These comparisons highlight that technical access is only the starting point; sustainable progress demands holistic investment in people, policy, and infrastructure.

Ethical judgment has become a cornerstone of computer education. As AI, surveillance, and misinformation permeate society, teachers must equip students to critically assess

bias in algorithms, protect privacy, and navigate digital identity. This requires embedding ethics into daily practice—not as an add-on, but as a core competency. Teachers must model transparency, advocate for data protection, and foster classroom cultures where questioning and debate are valued over passive consumption.

Globally, models diverge but converge on shared challenges. South Korea's rigorous, exam-driven CS education contrasts with Finland's inquiry-based, interdisciplinary approach. India grapples with scale, deploying national initiatives like NISHTHA to upskill teachers amid severe resource gaps. Emerging hybrids—such as Estonia's systemic integration—offer a blueprint: technology woven into all subjects, not isolated as a standalone course. These innovations reflect a growing recognition that digital fluency must be universal, not exceptional.

Controversies and risks underscore the profession's fragility. Algorithmic bias in educational tools, mental health impacts of relentless innovation, and teacher burnout stemming from constant upskilling and systemic underinvestment threaten sustainability. Addressing these requires not only policy support—better pay, reduced class sizes, mental health resources—but cultural change: elevating teaching as a dynamic, research-informed practice with autonomy and respect.
