Cognitive scientist Dr. Elena Volkov notes that structured stimuli reduce creative paralysis by lowering the threshold for initial engagement—particularly valuable in education, where students often face blank-page anxiety. Empirical studies, including a 2022 longitudinal analysis by the Global Creative Education Consortium, found that consistent exposure to diverse prompts correlates with improved divergent thinking and resilience in artistic practice. across Africa, Southeast Asia, and Latin America. Similarly, Latin American Illustrative Commons aggregates

prompts in Nahuatl, Quechua, and Afro-descendant styles, challenging monolithic representations. Yet institutional change remains slow.
