This reframing positions the jhanas not as escapism, but as a radical form of presence, a mental discipline with direct implications for ethics and social responsibility. The geopolitical context of mid-20th century Burma deeply influenced this interpretation. The country’s struggle for independence from British rule, followed by decades of military coups, ethnic conflict, and economic marginalization, created a society in crisis. Pa Auk Sayadaw emerged during the 1950s and 1960s, a period when Buddhist monasticism was both a moral anchor and a contested political force. The Sayadaw tradition, historically aligned with the monastic elite (sangha), found itself navigating between state control, nationalist fervor, and the need to preserve spiritual integrity. Pa Auk’s jhanas practice became a subtle yet potent assertion of inner sovereignty—an alternative to external power structures. By teaching meditation not as a passive discipline but as an active confrontation with the mind’s turbulence, he offered a path to resilience that resonated with a population enduring profound uncertainty. Economically, the rise of his practice coincided with the emergence of global mindfulness markets. Starting in the 1970s, Western interest in meditation exploded, driven by corporate wellness programs, psychological research, and consumer demand for stress reduction. Pa Auk’s teachings

transmitted through his senior disciples—many of whom established centers in Thailand, Myanmar’s diaspora communities, and eventually in the West—entered this ecosystem not as commodified products, but as serious meditative disciplines. Yet, this integration has sparked tensions. These centers operate with monastic oversight, maintaining strict protocols: full retreats lasting 10 days or more, daily precept observance, and teacher-student relationships rooted in vinaya compliance. The economic model here is not one of mass consumption but of intentional scarcity—retreats are often subsidized by donations, and teachers receive no salary beyond support from the sangha, reinforcing a non-commercial ethos. This contrasts sharply with the billion-dollar mindfulness industry, where apps, subscriptions, and branded retreats prioritize scalability over depth. Expert perspectives on Pa Auk’s jhanas reveal a schism

between traditionalists and reform-minded practitioners. Theravāda scholars like Professor Bhikkhu Sujato emphasize that the jhanas’ value lies in their integration with the Noble Eightfold Path—particularly right concentration (sammā-samādhi)—and that clinical psychology’s adoption of focused attention without the full doctrinal framework risks fragmenting samādhi from wisdom (paññā). In contrast, contemporary psychologists such as Dr. Daniel Goleman and more spiritually attuned researchers like Dr. Richard Davidson acknowledge the neurophenomenological correlates of jhana-like states: increased gamma wave coherence, reduced default mode network activity, and enhanced emotional regulation. In Japan, Zen masters observe parallels between zazen’s shikantaza and jhanas’ single-pointedness; in Sri Lanka,

progressive meditation teachers cite Pa Auk as influence on their retreat models. In the West, the rise of “contemplative entrepreneurship”—where meditation is branded as a leadership skill—has prompted a counter-movement seeking authenticity. Pa Auk’s legacy thus becomes a touchstone: a reminder that the jhanas, at their core, resist reduction to performance metrics or productivity hacks. They demand commitment, humility, and a willingness to dwell in silence—qualities increasingly rare in a world optimized for constant output. Looking forward, the long-term implications of Pa Auk Sayadaw’s jhanas practice are profound. As mental health crises escalate globally—with anxiety, depression, and dissociation reaching epidemic levels—the jhanas offer a counter-narrative: not one of denial, but of disciplined presence. This integration of ethical conduct with concentration practice distinguished his approach from some modern secular adaptations, which often isolate meditation from its moral and social dimensions. Geopolitically, the Sayadaw lineage developed amid Burma's colonial and post-colonial upheavals, which shaped both the monastic environment and the practice's reception. Economically, the expansion of the jhanas into global markets began in earnest during the 1980s and 1990s, coinciding with the rise of mindfulness capitalism. As corporate wellness programs adopted meditation techniques, demand for structured, intensive retreats grew. Pa Auk's lineage, though initially cautious, gradually engaged this market through affiliated centers in Thailand, Malaysia, and later Western nations. These centers maintained strict adherence to vinaya and retreat protocols, distinguishing themselves from commercialized yoga studios or app-based mindfulness tools. Their business model relied on donor support, modest fees, and teacher training fees—not mass consumerism—reflecting an ethos of sustainability over scalability. This dual positioning—spiritual authenticity amid commercial pressures—created tensions. While the jhanas' depth resists commodification, global interest has led to adaptations that sometimes dilute their transformative potential. The absence of formal vinaya training in many secular retreats, combined with the allure of “quick” absorption states, risks reducing the jhanas to stress management techniques. Yet, proponents argue that Pa Auk's original framework—requiring years of ethical conduct and mental discipline—acts as a safeguard against superficial

uptake. The geopolitical context also influences transmission patterns. Political instability in Myanmar since the 2021 coup has disrupted monastic networks, limiting in-person retreats and teacher exchanges. Yet, digital platforms have enabled continued dissemination, with recorded teachings and online sanghas maintaining the tradition's reach. This resilience underscores the adaptability of the Sayadaw jhanas, even as their practitioners navigate new risks and opportunities.

Expert Perspectives: From Traditionalists to Transpersonal Psychologists

Scholarly and clinical engagement with Pa Auk Sayadaw's jhanas reveals a spectrum of views, reflecting the practice's intersection with both religious tradition and modern science. Traditional Theravāda scholars, particularly within the Sayadaw Nikāya, emphasize the jhanas' role as indispensable steps on the path to enlightenment. For figures like Bhikkhu Sujato and Sayadaw U Silananda, the jhanas are not isolated states but integral components of the Noble Eightfold Path, particularly right concentration (*sammā-samādhi*). They caution against isolating rapture from wisdom, stressing that unchecked absorption without ethical grounding can reinforce egoic patterns rather than dissolve them. In contrast, contemporary psychologists and neuroscientists have increasingly turned to the jhanas as models for understanding focused attention and altered states of consciousness. Richard Davidson's pioneering work on meditation and brain plasticity highlights the neurophysiological correlates of deep

absorption—such as increased gamma-band activity and reduced default mode network activity—suggesting measurable changes in attention, emotional regulation, and self-referential processing. These findings resonate with Pa Auk’s insistence that the jhanas require sustained, disciplined practice, not passive effort. Dr. Daniel Goleman, in his studies of mindfulness and attention, notes that states akin to the first jhana resemble “focused attention” practices shown to enhance executive function and reduce mind-wandering. Yet, he acknowledges that true jhana absorption transcends mere cognitive control, involving a profound stilling that cannot be willed into existence.
