Yet beneath the surface of this neoliberal consensus, contradictions mounted. Financialization—where speculative capital replaced productive investment—distorted market signals, fostering instability and crisis after crisis. The 2008 global financial meltdown exposed the fragility of a system where justice was measured by balance sheets, not by human outcomes. Governments bailed out banks, yet austerity measures fell hardest on public services. The paradox deepened: markets demanded deregulation to “work efficiently,” yet unregulated markets generated systemic risk that required state intervention. This dissonance generated a crisis of legitimacy. Public

trust in institutions eroded, populist movements rose, and the demand for “real justice”—one that confronts inequality, restrains unchecked power, and reclaims democracy’s role—gained momentum. Economists and sociologists now debate whether capitalism can contain justice without distortion. Thomas Piketty’s ‘Capital in the Twenty-First Century’ quantified the long-term trend: when the rate of return on capital (r) exceeds economic growth (g), wealth concentrates irreversibly, undermining meritocratic ideals. Oxfam’s reports confirm that the world’s richest 1% now own more than twice as much wealth as the bottom 95%. In such a context, justice cannot be reduced to procedural fairness; it demands redistributive mechanisms, progressive taxation, and democratic oversight of capital. Yet in practice, capital often reshapes the rules—through lobbying, tax havens, and offshore finance—distorting governance and subverting public interest. Geopolitical power further conditions what justice means across regions. In the United States, legal frameworks prioritize property rights and contractual liberty, often constraining redistributive policies even amid social unrest. Europe, with stronger social democratic traditions, maintains more robust welfare states, embedding justice in collective responsibility. China’s state capitalist model presents an alternative: growth driven by state planning and industrial policy, where justice is defined through national development goals and poverty reduction rather than Western-style individual rights. In Africa and parts of Latin America, justice remains entangled with post-colonial legacies—land restitution, resource sovereignty, and reparative justice against historical extraction. These divergent paths reveal justice not as a single ideal, but as a function of historical experience, institutional design, and power distribution. Within industries, the impact of capitalist justice is starkly visible. In tech, algorithmic governance increasingly mediates access to credit, employment, and opportunity—systems that, while efficient, embed bias and exclude marginalized groups. The gig economy exemplifies this

tension: platforms classify workers as independent contractors, circumventing labor protections and social benefits. “Justice” here is defined by contractual autonomy, yet the reality is one of precarity, lack of recourse, and economic vulnerability. In finance, high-frequency trading and shadow banking enable rapid capital mobility, but at the cost of systemic opacity and risk externalization—justice becomes a matter of legal arbitrage rather than fairness. Meanwhile,
