The Kremlin's framing of the war as a "special military operation" to "denazify" and "demilitarize" Ukraine draws on a distorted narrative of Soviet-era revisionism—one that ignores centuries of Ukrainian statehood and self-identification. Geopolitical theorists such as John Mearsheimer label this expansionist push a "request for conflict," rooted in Putin's vision of restoring Russian hegemony. Yet Ukrainian resilience, supported by transatlantic solidarity, has transformed the battlefield into a war of endurance—one that challenges the very legitimacy of imperial revisionism. Controversies persist. The use of Western weapons—particularly long-range missiles—has drawn criticism over civilian casualties, raising ethical questions about remote warfare.
