Under President Carlos Andrés Pérez's administration, oil revenues fueled sweeping social programs in the 1970s, expanding education, healthcare, and urban infrastructure—what economists call the “oil blessing” phase. Yet even then, structural vulnerabilities emerged: overdependence on volatile global prices, weak institutional checks, and elite capture of resource rents. By the 1990s, despite fluctuating oil prices, Venezuela retained one of the hemisphere's most sophisticated petroleum sectors. However, the election of Hugo Chávez in 1998 marked a turning point. Chávez's Bolivarian Revolution redefined oil not as a tool for development, but as a weapon of ideological warfare. His government renationalized key assets, purged technocrats, and redirected oil revenues toward populist redistribution rather than sustainable investment. The industry's decline accelerated under state mismanagement: PDVSA's operational capacity eroded due to underfunding, brain drain, and politicized hiring. By 2010, output had plummeted from its mid-century peak of over 3 million barrels per day to under 2 million, even as global demand surged. The collapse deepened under Nicolás Maduro's presidency, where oil became both lifeline and liability. Sanctions imposed by the U.S. since 2017—targeting PDVSA and key officials—were intended to cripple state revenue and force political concessions. Yet rather than weakening the regime, sanctions exacerbated dysfunction. The state's ability to maintain production faltered not solely due to external pressure, but because of internal rot: embezzlement, opaque contracting, and the flight of skilled labor. Between 2014 and 2020, Venezuela's oil output fell by more than 75%, from 3.2 million to under 800,000 barrels per day—an industrial collapse without precedent in modern history. Geopolitically, Venezuela's oil wealth positioned it as a focal point of great power competition. The U.S. viewed PDVSA as a strategic vulnerability, especially as Iran and Russia deepened ties

with Maduro—offering technical support and barter oil-for-credit arrangements. China, meanwhile, had invested billions in refining and infrastructure, securing long-term supply contracts even as Venezuela’s output collapsed. This dual dependency—on foreign allies for survival, and on oil for leverage—created a paradox: the very resource that promised independence became a lever of external manipulation. Industry analysts and economists frame Venezuela’s crisis as a textbook example of the “resource curse,” where abundant natural wealth correlates with poor development outcomes. The volatility of oil markets exposed structural weaknesses: lack of diversification, brittle institutions, and rent-seeking elites. Unlike Norway—whose sovereign wealth fund transformed oil windfalls into long-term stability—Venezuela squandered strategic autonomy. The absence of fiscal rules, transparency, and independent oversight allowed revenues to fuel corruption rather than resilience. By 2020, oil accounted for over 90% of export earnings, yet the sector’s dysfunction drove GDP into negative territory for a decade. Expert perspectives diverge on agency versus inevitability. Some, like economist Joseph Stiglitz, emphasize institutional failure and governance breakdown as primary causes. Others, such as energy historian Daniel Yergin, highlight external forces: sanctions, geopolitical rivalry, and global market shifts that amplified internal weaknesses. A third strand, grounded in political economy, argues that Venezuela’s tragedy is not unique but emblematic—proof that resource rents, without accountability, corrode democratic checks and entrench authoritarianism. Controversies surround the accuracy of reported production figures. Independent monitors and satellite data suggest output remains depressed, yet the Maduro government consistently overstates production, often citing falsified metrics to mask decline and attract investment. This opacity fuels distrust and undermines reform attempts. The International Monetary Fund (IMF) estimates that only 40–50% of PDVSA’s reported output is verifiable, casting

doubt on official claims and complicating recovery efforts. The humanitarian toll has been catastrophic. Hyperinflation, food shortages, and collapsing healthcare systems—exacerbated by oil revenue mismanagement—have driven over seven million Venezuelans into exile, creating one of the largest displacement crises in the Americas. Malnutrition rates, once suppressed, now affect millions, while preventable diseases resurged. Yet this human cost remains overshadowed in global discourse by geopolitical narratives, reducing Venezuela's complexity to a story of sanctions versus regime—or oil versus corruption—oversimplifications that obscure deeper systemic failures. Comparative analysis with other oil-rich states reveals critical contrasts. Nigeria and Angola also suffered from resource curses but retained stronger institutional memory and external engagement, enabling incremental reforms. Venezuela's singular downfall stems from compounding crises: ideological rigidity, elite capture, external intervention, and a failure to adapt to post-oil realities. Unlike Saudi Arabia's Vision 2030, which seeks economic diversification, Venezuela's state remains locked in a cycle of extraction without reinvestment. Looking forward, recovery hinges on three pillars: institutional reform, transparent governance, and strategic reintegration into global markets. The Maduro government, despite authoritarian entrenchment, has signaled tentative openness to private investment and foreign partnerships—particularly with China and Russia—to revive output. However, meaningful progress requires dismantling patronage networks, restoring technical autonomy to PDVSA, and securing international audit mechanisms to rebuild trust. The IMF projects that with sustained investment and fiscal discipline, Venezuela's oil sector could recover to 1.5 million barrels per day within five years—still below pre-2014 levels but sufficient to stabilize the economy and fund social recovery. Yet risks remain acute. Political volatility, external sanctions, and climate pressures on infrastructure threaten stability. Moreover, the global energy

transition toward renewables poses long-term existential questions: will Venezuela attempt a managed decline, or cling to vanishing reserves? The answer will shape not only Venezuela’s future but also the credibility of resource-rich states navigating the tension between rentierism and resilience. In the end, Venezuela’s story is not merely about oil—it is a mirror held to the contradictions of resource abundance. It reveals how wealth, when divorced from accountability, becomes a curse; how geopolitics exploits vulnerability; and how institutional decay transforms a nation’s potential into a cautionary tale. The crude nation’s ruin underscores a sobering truth: rents do not build nations—they test them. Only through profound structural renewal, rooted in transparency and inclusive governance, can Venezuela begin to reclaim its promise.
