Enslaved Africans transported not only labor but entire cosmologies—Yoruba, Bantu, and Kongo spiritual frameworks—that fused with local traditions to birth syncretic belief systems. In Cuba, the **Legenda de la Negra Reina** (The Legend of the Black Queen) intertwines Yoruba **orishas** with colonial-era resistance motifs, portraying a powerful female figure who defies both Spanish overlords and spiritual oppression. This legend evolved during the 19th-century abolition struggles, becoming a symbol of defiance and ancestral strength. Scholars like Pascual Núñez emphasize that such narratives are not passive relics but active agents in the construction of black identity and political consciousness: 'These legends are repositories of resistance, encoding memory where official histories erase us.' The geopolitical context of the Hispanic world—marked by uneven development, persistent inequality, and cycles of revolution—has shaped the evolution and dissemination of these legends.
