The post-Cold War era brought a paradox: the promise of a “unipolar moment” coexisted with the rise of transnational challenges—climate change, pandemics, cyber warfare, and financial volatility—that defied national borders. Institutions like the World Trade Organization (WTO), formed in 1995 to govern trade, initially accelerated globalization, reducing tariffs and harmonizing rules. But by the 2010s,

backlash against open markets, fueled by inequality and perceived democratic deficits, eroded trust. The Doha Round collapsed, regional blocs multiplied, and unilateralism resurged. The WTO's dispute settlement mechanism, once its crowning achievement, now crippled by U.S. obstruction, exposing the fragility of rules-based systems when key powers withdraw. The OECD's Base Erosion and Profit Shifting (BEPS) initiative sought to rein in corporate tax avoidance, but enforcement

remains uneven. In technology, the absence of global standards for AI, data privacy, and digital sovereignty has led to fragmentation—China’s model of controlled internet governance versus the EU’s GDPR, the U.S. patchwork of state laws, and regional blocs like ASEAN struggling to harmonize. This regulatory fragmentation threatens not only economic cohesion but human rights and democratic norms. Expert assessments reveal a growing consensus: the current system is strained, not obsolete, but structurally incomplete. Yet without reform, legitimacy erodes. The UN Security Council’s veto power, designed to ensure great power buy-in, now enables paralysis on critical issues like Syria, Ukraine, and Palestine. Reform proposals—expanding permanent membership to include India, Brazil, Germany, and Japan—face resistance from entrenched powers wary of diminished influence. Similarly, the IMF’s quota formula, based largely on GDP and openness, underrepresents dynamic emerging economies, reinforcing a

for integrated, inclusive governance—if funded and implemented. Innovations like digital governance platforms, blockchain-based transparency tools, and transnational regulatory networks suggest new pathways. The rise of epistemic communities—scientists, technocrats, and civil society coalitions—provides a counterweight to state-centric gridlock. Initiatives such as the Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis, and Malaria demonstrate that shared purpose, when backed by sustained political will and equitable financing, can deliver transformative outcomes.
