The committee, guided by linguistic anthropologist Dr. Marcus Lin, avoided overtly controversial terms but preserved ambiguity where possible, reflecting a broader societal sensitivity to language as a site of ideological struggle. Moreover, the “word origin” segment functioned as a quiet counter-narrative to linguistic purism. Long-Term Implications and Strategic Projections Looking ahead, the 25th annual script signals a pivotal moment in the evolution of educational competitions.
