Chinese OEMs, such as Zhejiang Zijinsheng, often undercut Yamaha on price with simplified cooling designs but sacrifice long-term durability and thermal efficiency. This stratification reflects broader industrial dynamics: Japanese firms increasingly embed intelligence into mechanical systems, while cost-driven competitors emphasize throughput over longevity. Controversies have surrounded the

system's environmental footprint. Early models relied on non-biodegradable coolants and copper alloys with high embodied energy, contributing to marine contamination when leaks occurred. Though Yamaha transitioned to environmentally benign fluids and recyclable materials by the 2000s, the lifecycle impact remains debated. Environmental scientist Dr. Amara Nkosi observes: 'The shift to water-cooled systems reduced direct emissions but introduced new challenges—copper corrosion from heat-exposed piping, plastic leaching from degraded seals, and the carbon cost of manufacturing complex heat exchangers.
