Though distinct in philosophy—chiropractic rooted in structural adjustment, PT in therapeutic exercise and biomechanical optimization—both occupy overlapping clinical spaces: spinal care, post-injury recovery, and musculoskeletal symptom management. The convergence of these professions in billing practices arises from a structural mismatch between how healthcare is reimbursed and how care is delivered. In the U.S., third-party payers—primarily insurance companies and Medicare—rely on standardized coding systems: Current Procedural Terminology (CPT) codes and International Classification of Functioning, Disability and Health (ICF) frameworks. These codes determine eligibility, reimbursement rates, and provider liability. Medicare's National Provider Identifier (NPI) system and the Medicare Physician Fee Schedule mandate precise code assignment, with strict definitions of "reasonable and necessary" services. For a chiropractor to bill a PT code implies either: (1) a misinterpretation of scope, (2) a strategic coding choice to maximize reimbursement, or (3) a systemic failure in enforcement. The first two are matters of professional ethics; the third points to structural vulnerabilities. Early regulatory responses were fragmented. Chiropractors, often excluded from traditional medical billing systems, faced fewer audits, creating a perception of impunity. By the

This doctrinal split mirrors a broader jurisdictional ambiguity: while states regulate licensing, billing rules are often set by insurers, creating a patchwork of compliance standards. The geopolitical context deepens the

complexity. In nations with universal healthcare systems—such as Germany, Canada, and the UK—integrated care models are institutionalized. In Germany, for instance, chiropractors (Körpertherapeuten) and physical therapists operate under a unified rehabilitation framework, with joint billing permitted under shared diagnosis codes (ICD-10) and coordinated treatment plans. This contrasts sharply with the U.S., where fee-for-service silos and proprietary insurance systems incentivize professional isolation. The OECD’s 2022 report on healthcare integration cited the U.S. as an outlier: ‘Despite high spending, fragmented payment systems hinder care coordination, particularly at the boundary of complementary therapies.’ Globally, legal boundaries are drawn with varying rigor. In Australia, the chiropractic register requires explicit disclosure when billing codes outside primary adjustment, with audits targeting ‘scope creep.’ The UK’s NHS prohibits chiropractors from billing PT codes unless under formal referral pathways, enforcing strict role delineation.
