Subscription-based, nonprofit, and community-funded journalism models are gaining traction, offering alternatives to ad-driven dependency. The success of outlets like ProPublica, BuzzFeed News (in its reinvented form), and regional cooperatives demonstrates that quality journalism can survive—and thrive—when supported by civic investment. Pfeffer advocates for public funding mechanisms modeled on European public broadcasting, coupled with digital platform levies to redistribute economic value back to content creators and consumers. Third, technological design itself must be reimaged: algorithms audited for bias, platforms incentivized to promote accuracy over virality, and digital infrastructure built on principles of transparency and accountability. Pfeffer concludes not with despair, but with a measured call to action.
