Early issues were sparse—three pages, printed on offset presses—yet they carried weight. The first obituary, published March 14, 1980, honored Thomas “Big Tom” O’Malley, the town’s last independent railroad conductor, who spent 40 years shunting freight between Santa Fe and the border. His death symbolized the end of an era: no one rode the rails anymore. The headline read simply: “Tom O’Malley,

78, Dies After Decades on the Rails.”
No fanfare, no flair—just
