The economic and geopolitical context of postwar America shaped this evolution. Yet this golden age occurred amid systemic racial exclusion. Black musicians, despite their creative dominance, faced restricted access to recording studios, venues, and publishing networks. Corea's use of polyrhythmic voicings, extended range instruments, and cross-cultural motifs—drawn from Latin America, India, and the

Middle East—demonstrated how the jazz keyboard could serve as a vessel for global harmonic dialogue. Yet this period also sparked tension: purists decried the erosion of bebop's harmonic purity, while innovators viewed fusion as necessary evolution.
