In contrast, rapid growth in sub-Saharan Africa and parts of Asia offers vitality but also raises questions about doctrinal coherence and leadership succession. In Italy, for example, the Church's historical influence on family law and education remains palpable, despite secular governance. Within the Curia, however, formal leadership roles remain closed, reflecting institutional inertia. LGBTQ+ inclusion presents another fault line. Progressive voices within the Church—especially from Latin America and Africa—call for pastoral compassion over condemnation, urging a re-reading of scripture through lenses of love and justice. In contrast, doctrinal conservatives warn that reinterpretation undermines sacred teaching. The Church’s official stance, articulated in *Amoris Laetitia*
