Their research shows that frequent, high-quality assessment strengthens conceptual retention and metacognition. However, poorly designed exams—those emphasizing speed over depth or rote recall over

application—can distort teaching priorities. The College Board’s 2014 framework sought to correct this by embedding performance tasks that require multi-step reasoning, though implementation varies widely across school districts.

Controversies and Risks: High Stakes, High Pressure

The high-stakes nature of AP Chem has sparked persistent controversy. College admissions officers face pressure to differentiate candidates, and AP scores remain a key metric—especially at competitive institutions.
