The fragmentation of the tech order—driven by U.S.-China decoupling, regional blocs, and national security concerns—may lead to a "splinternet," where competing standards, networks, and regulatory regimes coexist. This could hinder global cooperation on climate, health, and cybersecurity, even as it accelerates innovation within blocs. The challenge for policymakers is to foster interoperability without surrendering sovereignty, ensuring that computing remains a force for shared prosperity rather
