These algorithms, trained on vast datasets, now auto-label the spinal cord in milliseconds, automating tasks once reserved for expert anatomists. But this automation introduced new tensions. The proprietary nature of AI models—shielded behind intellectual property laws—restricts transparency and reproducibility. A 2023 study by the University of Cape Town revealed that algorithmic labels varied significantly across institutions, with discrepancies in identifying segmental boundaries and nerve root distributions. This raises urgent questions: Who controls the anatomy? Who defines the norm? The commercial imperative also reshaped education. The spinal cord is not a static tube but a dynamic, segmented network—its functional zones influenced by age, pathology, and environmental factors. Yet, labeling tools often reduce it to a static map, potentially reinforcing outdated models in curricula. Expert voices diverge on the consequences. Dr. Elena Petrova, a neuroanatomist at the Max Planck Institute, argues: “Labeling is not passive description—it is interpretive. Every line, color, and annotation encodes assumptions about what is normal, what is damaged, and what is targetable.” She points to the persistent use of “T1-weighted” spinal MRI labels in clinical settings, which emphasize myelinated tracts but underrepresent gray matter complexity, potentially skewing diagnoses of conditions like multiple sclerosis or spinal cord injury. Controversial debates persist around regional nomenclature. This knowledge gap exacerbates health inequities, as accurate spinal diagnosis and surgical precision depend on precise anatomical literacy. Yet, hope emerges in collaborative initiatives. The Global Spinal Atlas Project, launched in 2020 by the International Spinal Research Consortium (ISRC), brings together 47 institutions across six continents. Using open-access, modular labeling standards, it develops regionally adaptable atlases that respect local anatomical diversity while maintaining global interoperability. This project exemplifies a new paradigm: one where labeling is not imposed, but co-created—anchored in both scientific consensus and cultural sensitivity. Risks accompany this progress.
