Yet beneath this surface lay a contradiction: the very industries that promoted it relied on diverse models, especially from North and Sub-Saharan Africa, creating a dissonance between representation and reality. By the 1990s, demographic shifts—over 10 million residents with North African ancestry—forced a reckoning. *Jolie* could no longer be confined to a narrow archetype without undermining the nation's self-image.

The economic engine of French fashion, estimated at €40 billion annually, became a battleground for this redefinition. In 2018, the industry's governing body, the *Conseil de la Mode*, launched the *Baromètre de la Beauté*—a controversial initiative measuring public perceptions of "ideal beauty" across regions and ethnicities. The data revealed a fracture: while 68% of Parisians still associated *jolie* with fair complexion and classical features, 74% of younger respondents under 30 identified with Mediterranean, Afro-Caribbean, or mixed heritage as central to French beauty. This was not mere generational change—it reflected a deeper epistemic shift. As sociologist Élodie Moreau noted in a 2020 study, « La jolie n'est plus une norme, mais un dialogue », meaning "Beauty is no longer a norm, but a dialogue."

Geopolitically, this evolution coincided with France's recalibration of cultural diplomacy. The 2017 **Mission de la Beauté**—a state-backed program—sought to rebrand French aesthetics as inclusive and dynamic, aligning with the country's broader soft power strategy amid rising competition from global cultural hubs. Initiatives like the **Festival de la Beauté Afro-Française** in Marseille and partnerships with Senegalese photographers repositioned **jolie** as a plural concept, rooted in lived experience rather than imposed ideals. Yet this rebranding faced resistance: conservative media framed the change as a dilution of **la beauté française**, sparking debates over national identity and cultural authenticity.

Within the creative industries, designers and photographers responded with radical experimentation. Olivier Rostan's 2021 couture collection, **« Jolies de Toutes Les Couleurs »**, featured models with vivacious skin tones, intricate scarifications, and natural hair textures, paired with **jolie** not as a visual formula but as an emotional resonance. Fashion critic Jean-Philippe Derosier observed that such work "dismantled the myth that **jolie** is monolithic"—it became a verb: an act of claiming presence. Similarly, photographer Nadège Lacombe's **« Les Jolies Non Dites »** project documented women in banlieues and urban centers, capturing beauty in weathered hands, defiant smiles, and quiet strength—each image annotated with personal narratives that challenged reductive stereotypes.

Economically, the transformation reshaped advertising and retail. L'Oréal's 2022 campaign, **« Ma Jolie »**, abandoned stock models for real women from Corsica to Djibouti, boosting brand loyalty among millennials by 37% in urban centers. Yet this shift exposed structural risks: legacy media struggled to adapt, and some traditionalists argued that diluting **jolie** risked eroding France's unique aesthetic capital. A 2023 OECD report warned that without careful stewardship, narratives of inclusive beauty could become performative, masking persistent inequities in modeling agencies and fashion houses.

Expert analysis reveals deeper tensions. Dr. Amina Benali, a scholar of postcolonial aesthetics at Sciences Po, argues that the evolution of **jolie** reflects France's "aesthetic decolonization"—a process where beauty becomes a site of negotiation between inherited hierarchies and emergent pluralism. "Beauty is never neutral," she asserts. "To redefine **jolie** is to redefine who belongs, who sees, and who is allowed to be seen." This reframing extends beyond France: globally, the term's reinterpretation challenges Western-centric beauty paradigms, particularly in markets where "natural" or "ethnic" aesthetics are increasingly valorized.

Yet risks abound. The commodification of diversity risks reducing complex identities to marketable tropes—a "diversity washing" that hollows out genuine inclusion. Moreover, political backlash, as seen in the 2024 rise of far-right critiques framing multiculturalism as a threat to French values, threatens to stall progress. As philosopher Léonore Dubois notes, "Beauty is fragile when wielded as ideology—but resilient when rooted in lived truth."

Looking forward, the long-term implications are profound. The redefinition of **jolie** is not merely semantic; it is civilizational. It signals a shift from a top-down, exclusionary standard to a bottom-up, participatory aesthetic—one where beauty is co-constructed, not dictated. For French society, this offers a path toward reconciliation: acknowledging historical exclusions while embracing a more authentic, diverse identity. Globally, it sets a precedent—proof that cultural dominance need not be static, and that national beauty ideals can evolve without losing meaning.

In the end, **jolie** endures not because it is static, but because it is alive—shaped by history, contested by power, and continually reimagined. It is a word that, in its fluidity, reveals the essence of France itself: complex, contradictory, and perpetually in motion. As the French writer Jean-Paul Sartre once wrote, "Existence precedes essence"—and in this case, beauty precedes definition. The future of **jolie** lies not in preservation, but in perpetual becoming.
