The 1950s and 1960s marked the “Atomic Age” peak, as nations sought to demonstrate technological prowess through reactor deployment, plutonium production, and nuclear deterrence. The U.S. led with its Shippingport Reactor (1957), the first full-scale commercial power plant, while France, under Charles de Gaulle, pursued an independent nuclear path, investing heavily in pressurized water reactors (PWRs) that would later define its energy independence. The Soviet Union mirrored this trajectory, building

RBMK reactors—later infamous for Chernobyl—driven by a combination of state ideology and Cold War competition. Yet this expansion was never purely technical; it was deeply embedded in political economy. The nuclear industry became a symbol of modernity, progress, and national strength. Governments subsidized research, guaranteed purchase prices, and created regulatory frameworks to support construction. However, the costs soon revealed themselves as systemic. Engineering challenges—material degradation, neutron embrittlement, waste management—were compounded by escalating costs, protracted licensing, and public skepticism. The 1979 Three Mile Island accident in Pennsylvania exposed vulnerabilities in operator training and plant safety culture, triggering regulatory tightening and public distrust. The 1986 Chernobyl disaster, resulting from flawed RBMK design and inadequate safety protocols, became a global turning point: a stark reminder that nuclear engineering failures carried transnational consequences. Amid this turbulence, engineering innovation persisted. The development of light water reactors (LWRs) improved efficiency and safety margins, while advances in fuel cycle management—reprocessing, burn-up optimization—extended reactor lifespans. The 1990s and 2000s saw a shift toward standardized designs, passive safety systems, and probabilistic risk assessment (PRA), transforming nuclear engineering from a craft-driven discipline into a data-intensive, model-based science.

Conversely, Germany's post-Fukushima phaseout (accelerated after 2011) illustrates how public fear and political will can override engineering rationale, shifting energy trajectories toward renewables and gas, with attendant carbon trade-offs. The rise of new nuclear states—such as China, which operates over 50 reactors and plans to nearly double capacity by 2035—reflects a reconfiguration of global influence. China's Hualong One reactor, a domestically developed PWR, exemplifies technology transfer and export ambitions, positioning Beijing as a nuclear vendor and standard-setter. Russia's Rosatom, with over 30 reactors under construction abroad, leverages nuclear diplomacy to expand geopolitical reach, often bundling financing, fuel supply, and waste management into single packages. This competitive landscape forces nuclear engineering into a broader strategic calculus: reactors are not neutral machines but nodes in a network of alliances, dependencies, and risks. The 2022 invasion of Ukraine and the attack on Zaporizhzhia Nuclear Power Plant underscored the vulnerability of nuclear facilities in conflict zones, reigniting debates over physical security, emergency preparedness, and the role of international bodies like the IAEA in monitoring contested sites.

Economic Realities: Cost, Competition, and Lifecycle Economics

The economic viability of nuclear engineering remains a central challenge, shaped by capital intensity, regulatory burdens, and competition from renewables. While reactor construction costs have soared—exceeding \$10 billion per large-scale LWR in recent years—operating lifespans have extended through uprates and extended licenses, improving levelized costs in some

cases. Yet delays and cost overruns are endemic: the U.S. Vogtle expansion, initially projected at \$14 billion, now exceeds \$30 billion, driven by supply chain constraints, regulatory hurdles, and design changes. The emergence of Small Modular Reactors (SMRs) and advanced reactor designs—such as molten salt reactors (MSRs), high-temperature gas-cooled reactors (HTGRs), and fast breeder reactors—promises reduced construction timelines, lower upfront costs, and improved safety. Companies like NuScale, Terrestrial Energy, and TerraPower are pioneering these second- and third-generation technologies, backed by governments seeking to revitalize nuclear's economic appeal. Lifecycle analysis further complicates the equation. While uranium mining and waste storage impose long-term liabilities, modern repositories—such as Finland's Onkalo—demonstrate engineered safety over millennia. Spent fuel reprocessing, though controversial due to proliferation risks, can recover up to 95% of energy content and reduce volume. Life-cycle greenhouse gas emissions of nuclear power are comparable to wind and solar, positioning it as a low-carbon alternative in hard-to-abate sectors like industrial heat and hydrogen production.

Expert Perspectives: Risk, Trust, and the Future of Engineering Ethics

Engineers and scientists working in the nuclear field operate at the intersection of technical mastery and profound responsibility. Yet financing, regulatory capacity, and public acceptance remain barriers. HTGRs, using helium coolant and ceramic-coated fuel particles, offer exceptional thermal stability and resistance to meltdown, with applications extending beyond electricity to desalination and synthetic fuel production. These innovations are not confined to the West. China's CFR-600 sodium-cooled fast reactor, operational since 2023, demonstrates closed fuel cycles capable of burning plutonium and reducing waste volume by up to 90%. Russia's BREST-300, a lead-cooled fast reactor, aims for proliferation-resistant fuel cycles and minimal long-lived isotopes, reflecting a global convergence on designs that prioritize sustainability and resource efficiency.
