In high-income nations, aging populations and automation reshaped long-term planning: Germany's dual vocational system gained renewed attention as a model for workforce resilience, while Finland's emphasis on teacher autonomy and equity became a benchmark for sustainable reform. Meanwhile, in low-income contexts, climate change introduced a new variable—displacement, school damage from extreme weather, and shifting demographics—that strained already fragile systems. The 13th edition dedicates extensive analysis to financing mechanisms, dissecting their technical design and socio-political ramifications. Public funding remains the backbone in most OECD countries, where education is enshrined in constitutional or statutory rights. Yet even there, the share of GDP devoted to education has declined in real terms in several nations—Japan, Greece, the UK—due to aging populations and competing fiscal priorities. The rise of income-contingent loan systems, pioneered in Australia and New Zealand, offers a counter-narrative: education debt tied to future earnings, reducing upfront barriers but introducing long-term fiscal and social risks. In emerging economies, user fees and private sector involvement have expanded rapidly, often promoted as engines of innovation and efficiency. In Kenya, Ghana, and Indonesia, low-cost private schools now serve millions, particularly in peri-urban areas underserved by public systems. However, these models frequently lack regulatory oversight, resulting in variable quality and exploitative practices. The volume documents how in some cases, private providers prioritize profit over pedagogy, exacerbating stratification. Yet in others—such as South Korea's cooperative

charter schools or Chile's regulated voucher system—carefully designed competition has spurred improvements in teaching standards and resource allocation. The digital transformation of education has introduced both opportunity and disruption. The 13th edition integrates findings from longitudinal studies showing how online learning platforms, AI tutors, and open educational resources (OERs) have expanded access—particularly during the pandemic—but also deepened the digital divide. In rural Bangladesh, remote learning remains a luxury; in Estonia, digital integration is seamless, underpinned by nationwide broadband and teacher training. In Vietnam, for example, PISA performance gains coincided with increased privatization and standardized testing regimes, raising questions about whose interests are served. Risks are manifold. Climate change threatens 120 million children’s access to education annually through school destruction, disease, and displacement—particularly in the Sahel, coastal Bangladesh, and Central America’s Dry Corridor. Funding volatility, driven by commodity price swings and geopolitical instability, destabilizes long-term planning. In Lebanon, hyperinflation and civil unrest have crippled public education financing, forcing NGOs and faith-based groups to fill critical gaps. The volume underscores how these risks are not evenly distributed: marginalized communities—refugees, Indigenous groups, rural populations—bear disproportionate burdens. Comparative analysis reveals divergent paths. Nordic countries maintain high, stable public investment, resulting in equitable access and strong learning outcomes. In contrast, many fragile states rely on volatile donor aid, creating dependency and policy instability. East Asian nations, especially South Korea and Singapore, combine high public spending with rigorous teacher development and performance incentives. Meanwhile, Gulf monarchies leverage sovereign wealth to fund elite global campuses and international
