many projects risk becoming white elephants that deepen dependency rather than catalyze self-reliance. Russia's presence, though less visible, has grown through private military contractors like the Wagner Group, which operated in the Central African Republic, Mali, and Sudan. These engagements, framed as security cooperation, have enabled access to uranium, gold, and agricultural land while circumventing formal diplomatic channels. However, Wagner's activities have been linked to human rights abuses and destabilization, raising questions about the long-term benefits of such arrangements. With the 2022 withdrawal of Wagner from Mali, Russia's influence appears to be shifting toward diplomatic and economic outreach, including arms sales and energy exploration, particularly in Angola and the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC). India's approach reflects a blend of historical ties and strategic foresight. Leveraging linguistic affinities—Hindi and English spoken widely—India has expanded soft power through scholarships, medical aid, and digital partnerships. The India-Africa Forum Summits, held every three years, have deepened cooperation in pharmaceuticals, IT, and renewable energy. Indian pharmaceutical firms supply over 60% of Africa's generic medicines, while tech startups in Bangalore collaborate with African entrepreneurs on fintech and agritech solutions. Yet India's economic footprint, though growing, remains modest compared to China's, constrained by limited direct investment and bureaucratic hurdles in

trade policy. Turkey's resurgence in Africa is driven by economic pragmatism and cultural diplomacy. Ankara has established over 50 trade offices and invested in construction, agriculture, and energy across West and East Africa. Turkish Cooperation and Coordination Agency (TIKA) has funded schools, hospitals, and water systems, fostering goodwill through community-level engagement. The presence of over 10,000 Turkish workers and entrepreneurs—many employed in construction and trade—has solidified Turkey's role as a non-traditional partner, particularly in countries with Muslim-majority populations. However, Turkey's strategy, while effective, often lacks the institutional depth of larger powers, making long-term sustainability a challenge. The Gulf states—particularly Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates—have pivoted to Africa as part of broader economic diversification and geopolitical realignment. Abu Dhabi's Mubadala Investment Company has committed billions to infrastructure and renewable energy in Ethiopia, Kenya, and Tanzania, while Riyadh has funded port development and agricultural projects in the Horn. These investments serve dual purposes: securing food and energy supplies amid climate uncertainty and countering Western and Chinese influence. Yet Gulf engagement remains fragmented, with competing state interests sometimes undermining coherence. Additionally, concerns about labor practices and environmental standards persist, particularly in large-scale land leases. Regional

actors are also asserting greater autonomy. The African Union's Agenda 2063 and the African Continental Free Trade Area (AfCFTA) represent a collective effort to reclaim agency, reducing reliance on external partners by fostering intra-African trade and industrial integration. Nigeria's leadership in ECOWAS, Ethiopia's diplomatic influence in the Horn, and South Africa's role in SADC exemplify how regional blocs are consolidating power. Yet internal divisions—ethnic, political, and economic—often hinder unified action, revealing the tension between sovereignty and collective ambition. The emergence of digital geopolitics further complicates Africa's encounter matrix. Chinese tech giants like Huawei dominate telecommunications infrastructure, enabling 5G expansion but raising data sovereignty concerns.
