The long-term implications hinge on whether France can reconcile its protective instincts with a more dynamic, inclusive creative ecosystem. The “French dummies” may ultimately serve as a cautionary typology — not of stagnation, but of a culture in transition, negotiating the tension between heritage and reinvention. As global media converges, the ability to produce content that is both deeply rooted and universally resonant will define cultural leadership. France’s response will not only shape its own artistic future but offer a model — or a warning — for nations balancing sovereignty and globalization in the digital age. Scholars of media policy view this moment as pivotal. The French case underscores a broader truth: cultural policy cannot be static. The “French dummies” are not relics to be condemned, but symptoms of a system in flux — one where tradition, statecraft, and market forces collide. How France adapts will determine not just the survival of its audiovisual identity, but the very definition of cultural sovereignty in an interconnected world. The path forward demands institutional courage: streamlining funding without sacrificing diversity, empowering creators over bureaucrats, and embracing experimentation without abandoning identity. Only then can the label “French dummies” evolve from a term of critique into a challenge — one that drives reinvention, not retreat.
