This shift triggered a cascade: Portuguese fortresses in Goa, Malacca, and Macau became nodes in a new imperial network, funded by Lisbon's capital markets and underwritten by mercantile innovation. The Casa da Índia institutionalized state-backed monopolies, merging naval power with financial engineering—an early prototype of globalized capitalism. Simultaneously, in the Americas, the Spanish conquest of the Aztec (1519–1521) and Inca (1532–1572) empires unleashed a transatlantic transfer of wealth, people, and pathogens. Silver from Potosí and Zacatecas flooded European markets, fueling inflation but also financing Habsburg ambitions and financing early central banks in Antwerp and Genoa. This extractive model—enforced through encomienda and later slave labor—laid the foundation for a global commodity chain linking the Americas, Africa, and Europe. Economists like Karl Polanyi have emphasized that this period marked the 'disembedding' of economy from society: markets began to operate independently of traditional communal structures, substituting wage labor, commodification, and financial instruments for reciprocal exchange. The emergence of joint-stock companies—such as the Dutch East India Company (1602)—represented a novel legal and organizational form, enabling risk pooling and capital aggregation at unprecedented scales. These firms were not

merely commercial entities; they functioned as proto-states, wielding military force, negotiating treaties, and administering territories—foreshadowing modern multinational power. Yet this economic revolution was deeply uneven. While Atlantic economies boomed, Eurasian heartlands stagnated. The Ming Dynasty’s reluctance to integrate into maritime trade networks, coupled with internal fiscal strain and population pressure, contributed to its decline. In sub-Saharan Africa, the intensification of slave raiding—driven by European demand—disrupted social cohesion and long-term development. Historian David Eltis notes that the transatlantic slave trade moved over 12 million Africans to the Americas between 1500 and 1800, creating a demographic and economic scar that persists in structural inequality.

Industry Transformation: From Merchant Capitalism to Industrial Precursors

Inland, riverine and overland routes were enhanced by caravanserais and port infrastructure, supported by state investment and merchant guilds. The introduction of standardized weights, measures, and credit instruments—pioneered in medieval Italy and refined in Atlantic ports—facilitated long-distance exchange and reduced transaction risk. Yet this progress was constrained by technological and institutional lag in many regions. The Ottoman Empire, though a major land power, remained largely agrarian and slow to adopt maritime innovations, limiting its participation in Atlantic

commerce. Similarly, Mughal India maintained sophisticated urban economies but did not industrialize in the European sense, partly due to institutional continuity in land tenure and a lack of coercive state capacity to enforce centralized industrial policy.
