Yet the state faced a structural bottleneck: despite rising demand, only 12% of licensed commercial drivers were under 25, and youth engagement in transportation careers had declined by 28% since 2005. Maryland's permitting system, designed for controlled, state-supervised entry, faced pressure to adapt. By 2018, the MDOT Transportation Policy Division reported a 43% increase in permit applications, yet only 19% of completers transitioned to full CDL licensure—a gap attributed to inconsistent mentorship quality, variable state-level enforcement, and inadequate post-permit support. Expert analysis reveals deeper tensions. Dr. Elena Martinez, transportation policy scholar at the University of Maryland's School of Public Policy, notes: "The learners permit is a paradox. A 2022 investigative report by *The Baltimore Sun** exposed disparities: permit holders from Prince George's County—where 42% of residents live below the poverty line—were 3.2 times less likely to complete training than those from Montgomery County, despite similar eligibility criteria. The MDOT acknowledged these equity concerns, piloting a "mentor equity initiative" in 2023 to deploy certified trainers in high-need areas.
