For Aboriginal peoples, particularly the Djab Wurrung and Taungurung nations, Frasers Ridge—known in ancestral tongues as *Wurrung-gul* or “place of the whispering winds”—is a living archive of songlines, ceremonial sites, and dreaming tracks. Oral histories recount seasonal movements through the highlands, where the ridge served as both a spiritual corridor and a resource corridor: stone tools quarried from its slopes, food gathered from alpine meadows, and water sourced from seepages along fault lines.
