U.S. election revealed a sophisticated playbook: creating fake personas, amplifying divisive content, and exploiting platform algorithms to inflame social fractures. These tactics were not isolated incidents but part of a broader hybrid warfare doctrine, blending cyber operations, propaganda, and psychological manipulation to weaken adversaries from within. Russian digital influence campaigns target not just Western democracies but fragile states in Africa, the Middle East, and Latin America, where disinformation exploits preexisting tensions—ethnic, religious, or political—deepening instability and eroding trust in institutions. In democratic states, the response has been fragmented and often reactive. The United States, despite its constitutional commitment to free expression, struggles with reconciling First Amendment protections against coordinated disinformation. Platform regulation remains politically fraught, with debates over Section 230 immunity, algorithmic transparency, and antitrust action against dominant tech firms consuming over 60% of digital ad revenue.
