The desert sun cast a sharp, golden slant over Riyadh's skyline the morning I arrived in 2017—a city suspended between tradition and transformation, where the weight of history presses against the momentum of change. My journey into Saudi Arabia was not one of mere tourism or business travel, but of immersion: embedding myself within the evolving pulse of a nation reshaping itself under the banner of Vision 2030. What unfolded was not just a personal odyssey, but a lens through which to examine a society in constant negotiation with itself—between religious orthodoxy and modernity, monarchy and meritocracy, isolation and global integration. I arrived at a pivotal moment: the early phase of Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman's ascent, when bold reforms were being unveiled with unprecedented speed. The country stood at a crossroads, where decades of conservative governance were being re-evaluated amid economic vulnerability, youthful demographics, and a strategic pivot toward diversification. My time in Saudi Arabia—spanning nearly a decade—unfolded across key sectors: energy, media, culture, and civil society, each revealing layers of complexity beneath the headlines of “women driving” and “entertainment reforms.” This was not a monolithic transformation, but a contested, incremental evolution shaped by internal power dynamics and external pressures. The origins of Saudi Arabia's current trajectory lie

in the nation's foundational duality: a state built on Wahhabi religious authority and tribal cohesion, yet increasingly compelled to adapt to global economic realities. Since the 1930s, the kingdom's identity has been anchored in oil wealth, religious legitimacy, and geopolitical alignment with Western powers—particularly the United States. But by the 2010s, this equilibrium began to fray. With oil revenues under strain from fluctuating global prices and climate transition pressures, Riyadh recognized an urgent need to redefine its economic model. Vision 2030, launched in 2016, proposed a radical departure: reducing oil dependency, empowering women in the workforce, expanding public entertainment, and attracting foreign investment. Yet, as implementation accelerated, so did scrutiny—both domestic and international—over the pace, depth, and consistency of reform. I entered the country during a period of profound transition. The old guard, steeped in cautious tradition, shared space with a rising cohort of technocrats, entrepreneurs, and young reformers eager to redefine Saudi identity. The state, under MBS's de facto leadership, launched sweeping initiatives: the privatization of Aramco, the creation of NEOM—a futuristic mega-city built on sustainable innovation—alongside cultural openings such as cinema, concerts, and mixed-gender public spaces. These moves were not merely symbolic; they reflected a strategic recalibration to secure legitimacy among a demographic where over 60% of citizens are under thirty. Yet, beneath the surface, tensions

simmered. The same institutions that championed reform also enforced social control, where censorship and political dissent remained tightly circumscribed. The paradox was not lost on me: a society simultaneously expanding personal freedoms while reinforcing authoritarian oversight. The energy sector, the lifeblood of the kingdom, became a critical theater of this transformation. For decades, Saudi Aramco had symbolized state power—its reserves unrivaled, its pricing influence global. But Vision 2030 demanded a reimagining of energy’s role: not just exporting crude, but pioneering clean hydrogen, carbon capture, and renewable integration. I witnessed firsthand the ambition behind projects like the \$500 billion NEOM, envisioned as a zero-carbon urban experiment powered by wind and solar. Yet, the shift was not without friction. Oil remained central to fiscal stability, and international skepticism lingered over whether Saudi Arabia could authentically transition from hydrocarbon hegemony to green innovation leader. The kingdom’s dual identity—oil-rich yet green ambitions—became a defining challenge of the era. I embedded myself in Riyadh’s administrative heart, attending cabinet meetings where reformist ministers debated policy with cautious officials from the religious establishment. I visited universities where young Saudis, many women now pursuing degrees in STEM and business, discussed their visions for a more open society. I observed cultural festivals in newly reopened parks, where families gathered under stars for the first time in generations—only to

note the persistent presence of male guardianship protocols in daily life. The media landscape, once tightly controlled, now buzzed with digital platforms and independent voices, though often walking a tightrope between creative expression and state sensitivity. The geopolitical context shaped every decision. Saudi Arabia's role in OPEC+, its rivalry with Iran, its peace overtures to Israel, and its alignment with U.S. security interests all influenced domestic reforms. The 2017 blockade of Qatar, the Yemen war, and the Khashoggi affair cast long shadows over Saudi Arabia's global reputation, complicating MBS's image as a progressive reformer. International partners and human rights organizations remained watchful, questioning whether reforms were substantive or strategic optics. Yet domestically, many citizens saw Vision 2030 not as a Western imposition, but as a necessary evolution to preserve Saudi relevance and resilience. Economically, the transformation was measurable but uneven. Unemployment among youth dropped from over 13% in 2016 to below 9% by 2023, driven by public sector hiring and private sector incentives. Yet, SME development lagged, foreign ownership restrictions persisted, and inequality—both regional and gender-based—remained stark. Women's labor force participation rose from 17% in 2017 to 36% by 2023, a historic shift enabled by policy shifts like the end of male guardianship for employment and travel. But cultural inertia and workplace bias constrained full integration. The digital economy surged—e-commerce grew at double-digit rates,

fintech expanded, and tech hubs flourished—but regulatory frameworks struggled to keep pace with innovation. I interviewed economists, activists, and ordinary citizens to understand the human dimension. A Riyadh schoolteacher, Fatima, spoke of pride in seeing her daughter lead a debate club, yet worry about her career prospects. A young entrepreneur in Jeddah described excitement over foreign investment zones but cautioned: “Reforms are real, but change is slow—especially for those outside the system.” The monarchy’s survival depended on balancing these competing realities—modernizing without alienating the base of traditional support, opening society without fracturing cohesion. Controversies shadowed the era. The detention of reform figures, including women’s rights activists, raised questions about the limits of tolerance. The tight grip on political dissent, even amid social liberalization, underscored the state’s prioritization of stability over pluralism. Internationally, Saudi Arabia’s human rights record continued to draw scrutiny, though diplomatic engagement increased as the kingdom positioned itself as a regional broker and economic partner. Comparisons to other Gulf states reveal nuance. The UAE, with its earlier push for global integration and cosmopolitanism, offered a contrasting model—less ideologically rooted, more overtly global. Qatar’s soft power and cultural investments paralleled Saudi ambitions, yet its smaller size and different geopolitical calculus shaped a distinct path. Iran, the perennial rival, deepened sectarian

and strategic tensions, reinforcing Saudi Arabia's positioning as a Sunni counterweight. The long-term implications of Saudi Arabia's transformation are profound. If Vision 2030 succeeds, the kingdom could emerge as a hybrid power—both a guardian of Islamic heritage and a catalyst for regional innovation. Its success would hinge on sustainable economic diversification, inclusive governance, and the ability to reconcile reform with legitimacy. Failure, however, risks backlash: youth disillusionment, economic stagnation, and renewed isolation. Looking ahead, the trajectory will depend on several factors: global energy transitions, U.S.-China competition, regional stability, and internal political cohesion. The rise of AI, automation, and green tech will test Saudi Arabia's adaptability. Will NEOM become a beacon of the future, or a costly fantasy? Can the state foster genuine civic engagement without compromising security? These questions define not just Saudi Arabia's fate, but the broader evolution of authoritarian modernization in the 21st century. My life in Saudi Arabia was not one of exile or resistance, but of deep immersion in a nation redefining itself. It was a journey through contradictions—between freedom and control, ambition and caution, tradition and transformation. What emerges is a portrait of a society in motion: imperfect, uncertain, but undeniably forward-looking. In Saudi Arabia, the future is being built not in spite of its past, but through its reckoning with it.
