In New York, he began to fracture tango's traditional 2/4 rhythm, stretching its meter into 3/4 and 4/4, injecting dissonant chords, and layering it with jazz harmonies and classical counterpoint. This was not nostalgia—it was a forensic deconstruction. The result was **nuevo tango**—a term both inevitable and contested, coined to name the rupture. Piazzolla's 1960s compositions like 'Adiós al Potrero' and 'Le Grand Tango' were not just new music; they were acts of cultural defiance.
